We have lost significant funding this year due to the cuts in the state budget. We are having to adjust to less staff, less hours, but not less work. And there is fear of more cuts in 2011.




Also with funding provided by the Louisiana Department of Education, we will host a parent conference during this fiscal year. More information to come in the next newsletter.




## Parent Spotlight

"Families Helping Families is just what it is", says Paula Dotson. She and her son Anson became a part of the "family" while residing in Baton Rouge after Hurricane Katrina. While in Baton Rouge, Anson began to stutter and fall to the side while sitting. She was told by doctors that Anson had possibly had a stroke due to Sickle Cell Disease. Not knowing what to do, Paula, a teacher at Early Head Start ARC of Baton Rouge, used one of their resources and contacted Families Helping Families of Greater Baton Rouge. Someone in that office worked to calm her down and gave her more resources to get additional help. Shortly after testing for a stroke, Paula, a single parent of three, moved back to New Orleans and contacted Families Helping Families of Southeast Louisiana and became a part of another family, seeking assistance from several FHF staff members. Paula was introduced to more resources, such as Metropolitan Human Services District and the SUN Center. The Dotsons have been through a lot, including being homeless, living in a car, with friends, relatives and in a shelter, as well as other emotional issues attending several schools. "This program has helped me get my child services that he deserves," Paula said. She has equipped herself with knowledge of the Individualized Education Plan, has participated in online trainings and has participated in the annual family forums. Paula enjoys giving others her testimony about her experiences with FHF, including when she calls or goes in crying and venting. But that is what families are for. She enjoys seeing her "family" around town, and sharing her own experiences with other parents, helping them seek out the services needed for their child as well.



## The End of Another Legislative Session

This year's Legislative Session, again, proved to be a tough one, not only in regard to budget issues and how it affected the individuals with disabilities in our community, but also in regard to the navigation and relaying of information due to the numerous delays. In the end, we celebrated some victories and, as usual, suffered some defeat as well. I would like to extend my thanks to the many LaCAN members who worked tirelessly to get the message out to our legislators about important issues that affect our family members, our families and in so many cases, the advocates themselves. We had a great turnout for our Statewide Rally at the Capital in April. Membership in the Region has grown which has resulted in greater participation overall in LaCAN Action Alerts and member visits to Legislators.

July begins the new fiscal year and so we start the process again. In the very near future, LaCAN will establish its directives for the coming year which will position us to go to our Legislators and let them know what is important to the families that we serve. In the fall Regional Round Tables will be held. I hope to continue to see our membership increase and I thank everyone who worked tirelessly this year to accomplish all we did. ## EarlySteps Transdisciplinary Program



The overall goal of this project is to develop and evaluate a program designed to support young children at risk for or diagnosed with an autism spectrum disorder and their families.

Evidence-based intervention strategies from the fields of early intervention, early childhood education, communication sciences and disorders and applied behavior analysis, will be implemented in the family's natural environments using a coaching and teaming approach.

A team will be formed around the family to offer support through consulting and collaboration. Families will work directly with one provider instead of multiple providers at different times.

The coaching approach provides necessary parent support to improve their child's skills and abilities rather than working directly with the child (Rush, 2000).

Teaming allows for joint planning and consistent feedback and reflection for all members participating on the team.

### Early Intervention

The National Research Council (2001) says that early intervention programs for kids with autism should:

- Be started as soon as possible and evaluated often;
- Provide at least 25 hours of intervention per week;
- Be based on research;
- Be specific to the child's needs and include families; and
- Include frequent opportunities to teach skills.

### Thoughts from Families on this approach:

*"Because of this service and my provider, we are finally getting to know our child in ways we never thought possible."*

*"The best part of this service model is the extreme pleasure in seeing all that your child is capable of doing and knowing that we are receiving the direct training to give our child these opportunities."*

*"It provides parents training to help their child reach goals and better function in everyday life."*

### The EarlySteps Transdisciplinary Program: What can you expect?

- A family-centered approach to intervention
- Collaborative effort to embed family-guided goals into daily routines and activities
- Teaming and collaboration through weekly meetings and daily interactions with family
- Training and support in activity-based interventions that will allow you to focus on teaching your child the skills most important to you
- Direct support and assistance provided in your home up to 4 hours each week through a primary provider

## Children's Special Health Services

Ever heard of it? Many have not. If you are a parent of a child with special health care needs, then this is for you.

Located inside Children's Hospital, Children's Special Health Services (CSHS) is a program of the State of Louisiana Department of Health and Hospitals Office of Public Health.

This program is for children with special needs, defined as 1) a child with a health problem that affects how the child grows, moves and acts, **AND** 2) a child who needs more health services than most other children.

CSHS offers doctors and other health care workers who provide services for children with special needs. Other services include care coordination, hospital care, tests, therapy, medicine, nutrition, equipment such as wheelchairs and braces, parent and family support, help finding home care services, help working with schools and community groups and offices, and help with the transition to adult life and care.

Who can get help from CSHS? A child can get help from CSHS if she or she lives in Louisiana, is less than 21 years of age, has a health problem that CSHS covers, and has Medicaid **OR** meets CSHS income rules.

To get help from CSHS, a parent can apply at a local parish health unit or call 504-896-1340. Parent liaisons Thuy Nguyen and Sue Roesky, staff members of Families Helping Families of Jefferson and located in the CSHS office, will gladly answer all of your questions.

## Get Involved!

### Affected by the Oil Spill?

**BP has established an Online Claim Form as well as a Claims Line for oil spill-related claims.**

**Online Claim forms** are available in three languages: English, Spanish, Vietnamese

The toll-free number for the claims line is **1-800-440-0858**. The line is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

Additionally, BP has established several claims offices along the Gulf Coast. The office hours are from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. each day.

#### **Federal disaster assistance information:**

Individuals and businesses looking for information on how to obtain Federal assistance for dealing with the impacts of the current oil spill should visit [www.DisasterAssistance.gov](http://www.DisasterAssistance.gov). Before applying for Federal assistance, individuals should first make a claim with the responsible parties. The website includes information on the types of Federal assistance that individuals and businesses can apply for such as nutrition programs, business disaster loans, temporary assistance for needy families and unemployment insurance.


